





Nutrition Program

- 5 serving/preparation kitchens (one in each building). Both breakfast and lunch served daily.
 - Students have several lunch entree choices:
 - Elementary: 2 daily entree choices and added fruit and vegetable bars this year.
 - Middle School: Approx. 5 daily entree choices and fruit and vegetable bar.
 - High School: Approx. 7 daily entree choices and fruit and vegetable bar.
- Average of 959 reimbursable lunches served/day

Elementary Goals

Reading Goal:

- 85% of all students will demonstrate targeted growth or proficiency in the area of reading as indicated on the MAP assessment utilizing effective, collaborative professional learning communities.
- 85% of all students will demonstrate targeted growth or proficiency in the area of reading as indicated on the NWEA or lowa Assessments.

Math Goal:

- 85% of all students will demonstrate targeted growth or proficiency in the area of math as indicated on the MAP assessment utilizing effective, collaborative professional learning communities.
- 85% of all students will demonstrate targeted growth or proficiency in the area of mathematics as indicated on the NWEA or Iowa Assessments.

Science Goal:

- In the 2017-18 school year K-2 classrooms each implemented 2 PLTW Modules. For the 2017-18 school year, the goal is full implementation which includes each K-2 classroom completing 4 PLTW Modules successfully and with fidelity.
- For the 2017-18 school year, the goal is full implementation which includes each K-4 (grades 3-4 at Davis) classroom completing 4 PLTW Modules successfully and with fidelity.

Culture/Climate Goal:

- Increase parent and student engagement through a positive and welcoming learning environment.

- 4. Throughout the 2017-2018 school year, staff, students, and parents will participate in collaborative processes that impact student learning.

GHS

Grinnell High School Goals 2017-18

- 1. During the 2017-18 school year, 50% of students in grades 9-11 will meet or exceed a year's NSS growth in Reading Comprehension on the Iowa Assessments. (District long-range goal #1)
- 2. During the 2017-18 school year, the percentage of students (listed below) will be engaged in cognitively complex tasks involving disciplinary literacy skills. (District long-range goal #2)
 - a. Students engaged in IPI Level 5 & 6 tasks will increase from 34% to 39%
 - b. Students engaged in <u>tasks aligned with AIW standards</u> will increase from 46% to 51%
 - c. Students engaged in <u>technology-based tasks</u> highlighting <u>critical thinking</u>, <u>problem solving</u>, <u>& decision-making skills</u> (as reported by students on the Clarity Survey) will increase from <u>Proficient to Exemplary</u>.
- 3. By the 2019-20 school year, the culture and climate of GHS will improve as per the following indicators: (District long-range goal #3)
 - a. Student 4 year graduation rates will increase from 90% (in 2015-16) to 95% (in 2019-20).
 - b. Student 5 year graduation rates will increase from 91% (in 2014-15) to 96% (in 2019-20).











FAST Assessment 16-17 Reading 5th-6th Grade




Iowa Assessment 4th Grade Reading




Iowa Assessment 4th Grade Math




Iowa Assessment 4th Grade Science




Iowa Assessment 8th Grade Reading




Iowa Assessment 8th Grade Math











ACT Data: Participation Trends




ACT Avg. Composite Trend




ACT Avg. English Trends






Graduation Rates: Most recent as released by the Dept. of Ed.

College Enrollment by Institution (4 Year vs. 2 Year)


